How to File an Appeal to the ABCC made by an LLA

License holders and applicants have the right to appeal a decision from their Local Licensing Authority to the ABCC. Below is what you need to know regarding appealing a decision made by your Local Licensing Authority:

The LLA must mail a notice to an applicant or licensee, in addition to the ABCC, with regard to the following actions:

LICENSE APPLICATION DENIALRELICENSE SUSPENSIONLICLICENSE AMENDMENTSLICDENIAL OF APPLICATION FOR LICENSE TRANSFERLIC

REFUSAL OF LICENSE ISSUE LICENSE REVOCATION LICENSE CANCELLATION

The notice must state the reason for such action. The applicant or licensee must appeal the action of the LLA to the ABCC within 5 business days of receipt of the LLA's written decision. For new license applications, the applicant can also appeal if the LLA does not act within 30 days of the application's receipt.

How to Appeal

By mail

This is the preferred method for filing an appeal of an action from your Local Licensing Authority. The mailing address is:

In person
